GWI is proud to lead the consortium delivering the research component of What Works to Prevent Violence against Women & Girls: Impact at Scale. This seven-year initiative from the UK Foreign, Commonwealth & Development Office is the largest ever project studying and upscaling effective measures to prevent gender-based violence.

GWI's core partners are Aga Khan University (Pakistan), the Equality Institute (Australia), Johns Hopkins University (USA), University of Cape Town (South Africa), and the Women's Economic Empowerment Hub at Kenyatta University (Kenya).

Dozens of individual and organizational resource partners from around the world have joined this research consortium, including the Sexual Violence Research Initiative (SVRI), CEHAT, Makerere University, and others.

Our research consortium works alongside an implementation consortium led by the International Rescue Committee (IRC), with Raising Voices, CARE International UK, Social Development Direct (SDD), Samya, and Breakthrough. They are supporting innovative programs and scale up successful interventions. Together, we are using the evidence and practice-based learning from across the project to build support and strengthen funding for evidence-based GBV prevention programmes.
